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Beginning with a bang

Message from the District Minister Rev'd Jim Corrigall

appy New Year to you all! It's going to be a busy year judging by the programme ahead. Really? What's going on? Well, here's a quick preview of events in the District (and they're covered in more detail elsewhere in this newsletter).

Innovation Challenge Scheme

Firstly, consultations with members and congregations are taking place on the denomination's new growth plan, the 'Innovation Challenge Scheme'.

Ambitious in scope, it's already winning key support. But others feel the plan demands too much of weaker congregations. Whatever your views, let your voice be heard in the coming months, as the scheme is open to modification in the light of criticisms and suggestions.

On Saturday 3rd February, Unitarians concerned about the climate crisis gather at Essex Unitarian Church in Kensington to hear informed speakers and to plan how best to contribute to the struggle to tackle climate change. Booking is required for this day-long event organised by Unitarians for Climate Justice.

On Monday 5th February there's a lecture about the prominent 19th-century Unitarians, the Gaskells: the

novelist Elizabeth and her husband William, who was a leading Unitarian minister. It's at Harris Manchester College in Oxford from 5.15pm, in the Chapel or livestreamed. And later in February,

investreamed. And later in February, interfaith services for Unitarians in the District are being organised ... details still being finalised.

Our District's AGM is at Croydon Unitarian Church on 16th March, with the President of our General Assembly leading the worship, followed by a key Executive Committee member making a presentation on the new growth plan. As always, there'll be good hospitality and good cheer at Croydon.

Early the following month, the **General Assembly's Annual Meetings** take place at Daventry in Northamptonshire, from 4 to 6 April, where we hope for a good District presence.

nitarians for Climate Justice (U4CJ) was formed early last year to connect Unitarians who want to get involved in the global struggle to tackle climate change, environmental degradation and the exploitation of indigenous people and the global poor.

We're holding a gathering for all Unitarians and friends who want to be part of this – perhaps the defining moral issue of our era – to meet, hear informed speakers, share our anxiety and hope and plan how we may join the growing number working for a better future for all earth's beings. It will be held on Saturday 3rd February at Essex Church, Kensington, London.



We are excited that Clare Farrell and Dr Tim Harrison (*pictured above*) have agreed to join us and speak about their approaches to environmental work. Clare is a fashion designer and environmental activist whose sense of urgency about the climate crisis led to her to become an original organiser of Extinction Rebellion. She'll talk about how her devotion to defending life on earth and finding the limits to her own courage has changed her life. She'll also address how an exploration of faith and our relationships can help us confront the world's ecological crisis.

Tim's background is in ecology and ornithology. Currently a teacher in Suffolk, Tim is passionate about engaging young people in environmental issues and the natural world. He'll lead an interactive session on 'environmental eating', which has profound implications for tackling both the climate and extinction crises.

The day will include a session for 'creative expression' to help us tap into the creativity that can sustain and nurture our faith amid our struggles. We'll end with a Climate Vigil led by Unitarian Minister in training, Shana Begum.

Lecture on the Gaskells

Oxford College explores its traditions

ne of the most celebrated
Unitarian couples of 19th
century England, the Gaskells,
are the focus of a major lecture at Harris
Manchester College, Oxford, next
month. Entitled 'William and Elizabeth
Gaskell: The Unitarian Making of a
Novelist', the talk will be given by
Professor Dinah Birch on Monday 5th
February at 5.15pm in the College
Chapel. It will also be livestreamed.

Professor Birch is a specialist in Victorian literature and is Emeritus Professor of English Literature at the University of Liverpool. She has published extensively, including on Elizabeth Gaskell.



Elizabeth Gaskell was one of the leading English novelists of the 19th century; she had a strong social conscience as seen in works such as Mary Barton and North and South. She and husband William lived in Manchester, where he was a prominent Unitarian minister.

This event is the first of a new series, the Manchester lectures, exploring the College's history. It's part of an ambitious programme by the (relatively) new College Principal, Professor Jane Shaw, to honour the history and ethos of this institution which was founded and run by Unitarians for more than two centuries.

Jane Shaw has already revived the historic Upton Lectures, and later in January, Baroness Scotland will give the first Tayler Talk in London. These talks are named after Prof. Charles Upton, an Anglican, and J.J. Tayler, a Unitarian minister and abolitionist, both of whom taught at Manchester College.

Founded in Manchester by Unitarians in the 18th century, the College later moved to London and finally to Oxford, in the 19th century. It became a full Oxford college 30 years ago, after Unitarians were no longer able to maintain it. Unitarian ministry students still train at Harris Manchester College, as it's now called.

Spring Quarterly + AGM

And then a leading member of the GA's Executive Committee, John Bates, will present its new growth plan for congregations known as the Innovation Challenge

Scheme (see next page).

John, who has a distinguished background in business and academia, is the key motivator and architect of this new growth scheme. Our District Council has broadly welcomed what it describes as an 'exciting plan' but this is your chance to ask questions and have your say – love it or loathe it, come and give your views! There'll be a streamlined AGM too, but with such a varied programme we were pleased to name this gathering a 'Spring Quarterly'. These are to be held this year at Staverton Park Hotel, Daventry, Northamptonshire, from 4-6th April. This hotel has excellent facilities. Apart from talks, worship, business meetings and socialising, the programme offers an exciting time for children and young people. Bookings now open.

Response to growth plan

he General Assembly of Unitarian and Free Christian Churches has begun consultations on its ambitious new proposals for congregational growth, known as the Innovation Challenge Scheme.

The proposals were published on 5th December and our London and South East District (LDPA) has sent details to all congregations. The model of partnership described is full of promise. District Council discussed the proposals at a special meeting and subsequently sent a short initial response to the GA. Fuller consultations will be held in the District.

Our special Council meeting explored questions such as affordability, readiness of congregations to participate, and the District's capacity to support congregations in the process.

Key points from our discussion are:

- The Council believes the Innovation Challenge Scheme to be an exciting proposal that, with the right support structures and human and financial resources, has the potential to revitalise our Unitarian movement.
- The Council through supporting partnerships of congregations and/or

- as a District working with congregations – would like the LDPA to be an 'early adopter'.
- There will be real challenges in getting Innovation Challenge projects developed, even with the relative strengths and advantages of the LDPA's resources and encouragement, but they are worth embracing to reignite the Unitarian flame as an inspiring 'temple of ideas'.
- We should be realistic about the level of resources and energy that will need to be invested to make any project sustainable.

Here is a framework – backed with a promise of money – to ensure our Unitarian values of a free and inquiring religion, service of humanity and respect for all Creation, continue to feed our spirits well into the 21st Century. Let's boldly engage with what is being offered.

I pray that we embrace this Scheme, wisely, with heads and hearts.

What's on offer?

A rich mix of music and song, prayer and meditation, talks, workshops, socialising, nature walks and a children's programme, all at this historic friary.

What's the theme?

'The Power of Story + Song' with Hanna Yaffe from Jerusalem as the theme speaker. Hanna describes herself as 'an ardent peace-maker' who uses stories and music to foster healing and unity in her work with Jewish, Christian and Muslim musicians and story-tellers in Israel/Palestine and in the UK.

Anything different this year?

The new theme has inspired a range of workshops. There'll also be more emphasis on the body this time – with circle dancing, embodied meditation and 'nature bathing' all available. And leaders of the General Assembly and Unitarian College will be making separate presentations on their work – a first for FUSE.

Why should you book early?

Booking closes on 17th May, four weeks before the start of FUSE. This is to allow the centre time to let out any rooms we do not fill. Booking early may help you secure a room suitable for your needs, although this can't be guaranteed.

What capacity does The Friars have?

There are 68 bedrooms available, many suitable for sharing. Only a few bedrooms are on the ground floor, so let us know if you need one. Rooms are comfortable and the food is good, but the centre does not meet full hotel standards. There are hotels in Aylesford and nearby Maidstone if you'd prefer.

Funding for Citizens UK

he London and South East
District has committed funds to
enable congregations in the
District to join Citizens UK and to take
part in its social justice campaigning.
This involves congregations in London
as well as those beyond the capital.

The decision was taken at a District Council meeting last November: £2,500 was committed for London Citizens membership to last until the end of June 2024. In addition to New Unity, which was already a member, the following congregations are now included in London Citizens and can take part in local and national activities: in North London (Rosslyn Hill and Golders Green), in West London (Kensington), in East London (Stratford) and in South London (Lewisham Unity). It is hoped that members of other London congregations might join in activities as Unitarians.

The District also voted to contribute half the joining fee to congregations outside the M25 who are interested in joining Citizens UK. Oxford is in the process of joining the organisation, and the District is paying half its £700 fee.

Training opportunities

There are training opportunities for members in community organising: a free training day, as well as three- and six-day courses at reduced rates.

Citizens UK groups in south east England are currently campaigning in areas such as climate change, homelessness and housing, support for the Living Wage and the welcoming of refugees.

The driving force behind this process for Unitarians has been Rev'd Julio Torres, minister at Lewisham Unity and member of the LDPA Council. He's offered to take on the administrative tasks to enable Unitarian congregations to engage. In particular, he is appealing for support at the London Mayoral Accountability Assembly on 25th April, when London Citizens will present its agenda for change to candidates for London mayor.

Men's groups merge

Then we met for the LDPA Quarterly last October, collaboration between congregations was a primary area of focus. The men's groups at Rosslyn Hill Chapel and New Unity took that idea to heart. In November, our two North London groups held their first joint meeting, and shortly afterwards decided to merge. In the coming months the combined men's gathering will select a new name and align their covenant statements, meeting formats and timings.

Through sharing organisational work, we intend that the merged group should serve more people and to greater effect. We even hope this might serve as a model for co-operation between congregations in the future.

But I hear a distant cry:

Why have men's groups? Well, my answer has been: 'Men often have trouble building meaningful connections with each other, and discussing any kind of relationship can be a challenge for a lot of men. Moreover, some male issues warrant discussion within a group that can ensure confidentiality. Finally, there are times when men may need to unpack male-dominant perspectives in a manner that, frankly, women shouldn't have the burden of sitting through.'

As far as topics go, we've talked about friendship, anger, and what we need from our congregation(s).

How an Essex town became a Hucklow outpost

here are always surprises in being a Unitarian minister.
A recent one for me was to discover that disadvantaged children from Southend-on-Sea in Essex are taken on holiday each year to the Unitarian Nightingale Centre at Great Hucklow in the Derbyshire Peaks.

Then my questions came: But I thought those Unitarian-sponsored holidays were only for inner-city kids from the North and Midlands? Not so, it seems! And anyway, we don't really have a Unitarian congregation in Southend anymore, so how is this possible? Well, thanks to Christine Hayhurst of the Send a Child to Hucklow Fund and some delightful youth workers from Southend, I've been able to piece together the story.

Twelve years ago, Southend youth worker Hayley Duff was looking for a central venue for her youth groups to meet. She came across the Unitarian meeting house and it seemed ideal. It was lovingly looked after by caretaker and committee member Gary Leggett and cleaner Synnove, she recalls. The youth groups have been meeting there ever since.

One day Gary gave Hayley a leaflet about holiday trips to Hucklow for children from disadvantaged backgrounds. *Just right*, thought Hayley, and for the past 10 years, the Southend Association of Voluntary Services has been arranging for local children from families who can't normally afford such holidays to go to Hucklow for four or five-day breaks.

Last year, 20 Southend children (aged 8 to 13), together with local youth leaders, made the 400-mile round trip. In a letter to the Unitarian charity, youth leader Aimee Bruin gave a detailed account of their holiday, including the care taken beforehand in preparing children (and their families) for the excursion. She writes of the joy children found on the walks and outings in the Derbyshire countryside, as well as in the food, accommodation and games at the Nightingale Centre. A very positive experience for all, she said.

What's the Send a Child to Hucklow Fund?

It's our leading Unitarian charity, still going strong after 60 years. Last year it provided holidays for almost 400 children, in 20 groups, from urban centres in the North and Midlands (and also from Southend!).

The charity began with an idea of Rev'd Peter Godfrey, who'd been taking Unitarian youth groups to Hucklow. He realised the Nightingale Centre needed more visitors, particularly during the week. What about providing young people from difficult backgrounds with the chance to experience the beauty of the Derbyshire countryside? By raising money to pay for this, the charity was born.

It remains very active, sustained by donations from Unitarians around the UK. Peter Godfrey is now Life President,



and his daughter Sarah Benfield is Chair of Trustees. To donate to the Fund, go to: www.sendachildtohucklow.org.uk

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Oxford's guest preachers

xford Unitarians are now using monthly themes to focus on specific spiritual values, and for the month of February we have chosen the theme Justice and Equity. We are privileged to be having two non-Unitarians address our congregation on this theme. Everyone is welcome to attend, either 'in person' in the beautiful Chapel at Harris Manchester College, or online via Zoom.

So who are our guests?

On 4th February, local member Holly Templer will co-lead the service with Keith Hebden, who is lead organiser for Oxford Citizens, the local branch of Citizens UK. Holly is a member of Oxford Unitarians' Social Justice Group and has been a passionate social justice campaigner for 10 years. Before moving to Oxford in 2022, she was a member of New Unity in Stoke Newington, North London. There, through New Unity's membership of Citizens UK Holly helped win local community campaigns, including fixing damp in 100 council homes, organising training in mental health and first aid within 30 local businesses, and in securing homes for dozens of Syrian refugee families.

Holly explained her own journey: "I used to find politics boring. I hated seeing decision makers promising what they think we want to hear and then not following through on their promises. Things changed for me when I attended a Citizens UK assembly."

Citizens UK forging alliances

Citizens UK is a non-partisan charity that helps faith groups and community organisations work together for the common good. Keith Hebden is a former Church of England priest and author of books on faith and justice, including Re-Enchanting the Activist: Spirituality and Social Change. He has helped forge alliances in social justice campaigns in several areas: Gloucester, Mansfield, parts of Leicestershire and the Thames Valley. Keith lives with his family in Didcot, having moved to the area for his wife's work in climate research.

In their service, Holly and Keith will highlight how working together for justice and equity can strengthen our community and our faith.

Secularism as a model

Then on 18th February, Megan Manson (pictured right), head of campaigns for the National Secular Society, will co-lead the service with Oxford Unitarian member Sheila Bond. Megan previously worked for the Japanese government promoting cultural exchanges and language learning. She has long been active in local interfaith initiatives, and her own faith tradition is paganism. She will speak on how 'secularism', that is the separation of church and state, provides a model for how everyone in our diverse UK society can live together in harmony and equality.

Our weekly 'hybrid' services are held every Sunday at 11am and all are welcome to attend either online or in person. All our services are livestreamed, and most are recorded, edited and posted on our website for later viewing.

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Grants and Funds

Congregations within the LDPA might be eligible to apply for grants from a variety of funds and trusts. This listing is designed to give information about these trusts and funds, their terms of reference and their primary contacts.

London District

The LDPA administers funds from which it makes grants to congregations and Unitarian organisations in the LDPA area for various purposes in keeping with its goals. This may include assistance with ministry, social action, publicity or expansion work. Applications should be made to the District Minister, email: district.minister@ldpaunitarians.org

In all grant applications, full details should be submitted, including project costs, congregational budget for the current or coming year and sources of other funding, to enable the LDPA to make an informed decision. It should be noted that some funds will not give grants if work has already commenced.

The LDPA can very occasionally offer financial help with repairs to buildings, usually by loan. However it should be recognised that the LDPA has very limited capital resources for this type of work.

General Assembly

Grants are made towards Ministers' stipends by the General Assembly Sustentation Fund on the recommendation of the LDPA. Applications for annual stipend grants from both the LDPA and the Sustentation Fund are made on a

single form, obtainable from the District finance officer or District Minister, and should normally be received in September for the grant year beginning in October. Applications must be accompanied by the congregation's accounts and budget.

Other General Assembly Trusts and Funds might be available for assistance with stipends, buildings and/or special projects. Enquiries should be made to Unitarian Headquarters, Essex Hall, 1-6 Essex St, Strand, London WC2R 3HY www.unitarian.org.uk

The Hackney and Stamford Street Chapel Funds

Applications are invited from Unitarian congregations in London and the South East for the 2024 meetings of the New Gravel Pit Unitarian Chapel Fund, commonly known as the Hackney Trust, and the Stamford Street Chapel Fund, which will take place in late May 2024. The trustees may make grants to assist with the maintenance, repair and upkeep of LDPA churches and chapels, but not church halls or manses. The Stamford Street Chapel Fund is restricted to those congregations within the Greater London area. For some years the trustees of the two Funds have been working towards closer cooperation,

together with the trustees of the Highgate Hill Unitarian Church Fund.

For applications the trustees will require the following information: a detailed statement of the work to be undertaken; copies of any quotations or estimates received for the work; and a copy of the congregation's most recent annual accounts. Highgate Trust

The Highgate Hill Unitarian Church Fund (1961) makes small grants towards stipends of ministers or lay leaders of LDPA congregations. They work closely with the Hackney Fund and Stamford Street Chapel Fund Trusts, who make grants toward maintenance of buildings. The Highgate trustees will be meeting in late May 2024.
